PSA OFFICE MISSION STATEMENT

The Office of Public School Academies and Urban Partnerships (PSA Office) seeks to carry out the School of Education and Human Services (SEHS) vision by:

- 1. Establishing partnerships between public school academies and Oakland University such that academic achievement of children in the academies develops in a positive direction;
- 2. Offering workshops, training and research that provide a deeper understanding of charter school environs and their ability to meet the educational needs of children;
- 3. Utilizing Oakland University faculty and staff expertise in ways that have a positive effect on student outcomes in public school academies; and
- 4. Providing accountability and monitoring services that assist public school academies in providing quality education programs that meet or exceed state and federal guidelines and standards.

HISTORICAL BACKGROUND

Charter schools, or public school academies (PSA), are public schools that come into existence via a contract with a two-year or four-year college, an intermediate school district, or a local school board. In the mid 1990's, the Michigan state legislature approved 150 schools to be chartered by universities.

The charter contract establishes the framework within which the school operates and provides public support for a specified period. The school's charter gives the school autonomy over its operation. In exchange for the flexibility afforded by the charter, the schools are held accountable for achieving the goals set out in the charter, including improving student performance and compliance with federal and state laws.

In October 1996, Oakland University ("University") authorized its first PSA, serving 104 kindergarten through fourth grade students. In February 1997, the second PSA was established. For the current school year, the University authorizes seven PSAs, serving more than 5,600 students in the metropolitan Detroit area. An eighth PSA is scheduled to open in September of 2009.

CHARTER SCHOOLS - A NATIONAL PERSPECTIVE

- There are currently more than 1.4 million students attending over 4,600 public charters schools in 40 states and the District of Columbia.
- Among all states, Arizona has the highest market share of students in public charter schools at 9%.
- Among all cities, New Orleans has the highest market share of students in public charter schools at 55%.
- There are limits or caps on the number of charter schools that may exist in 26 states.
- Minority students make up 60% of all students in public charter schools (2006-2007).
- School choice, fundamental to the public charter school concept, has strong public support. A recent national poll (April 2008) revealed that 77% of registered voters favor giving parents more options when choosing a public school for their children. source URL:: http://www.publiccharters.org

MICHIGAN CHARTER SCHOOLS FACT SHEET

- Six percent of Michigan schoolchildren attend PSAs.
- Universities and community colleges continue to be the primary authorizers of PSAs – authorizing 187 of the 232 PSAs total.
- A 1993 legislatively mandated limitation of 150 university- authorized PSAs remains in place (Public Act 362, Part 6A).
- Charter school law passed in 2003 allows creation of fifteen "urban high school academies" in a first class district (Public Act 179 of 2003, Part 6C). To date one school has been opened under this provision.
- PSA average per-pupil revenue is \$9,402. This average is \$535/pupil below the traditional public schools average (2006-07).
- Average teacher salary in PSAs is \$39,334. Statewide teacher average is \$55,526 (2006-07).
- As a PSA authorizer, the University is entitled to 3% of the total state school aid appropriations for PSA oversight.

"BEATING THE ODDS"

Michigan Department of Education (MDE) identified 52 PSAs during the 2007-08 school year that succeeded in achieving over 60 percent proficiency with populations of more than 50 percent free and reduced-price lunch. Four of the University's seven PSAs were among these schools that "Beat the Odds." The four schools are Detroit Academy of Arts and Sciences (elementary), Dove Academy, Detroit Edison Public School Academy, and Star International Academy.

A professional development support program provided assistance to teachers at Star and Universal Academies as the schools pursue their International Baccalaureate (IB) certification. (ongoing)

Student Outreach

"Building Bridges for the Future: A Pre-College Summer Camp," a 3 nights/4 days residential summer camp for PSA students in grades 6-8th took place June 29-July 2, 2008. Fifty-three students participated in recreational activities, field trips and academic classes consisting of Chinese language and culture, biology, chemistry and engineering classes taught by OU faculty and graduate staff. The PSA Office, partnering again with the Pre-College Programs department, will offer the camp this year for June 28-July 1, 2009.

PSA (Push for Student Achievement) Day @ OU-11/12th graders from OU academies learned admission and general college information, toured the campus and dined at Vandenberg Hall. (November 2008)

Detroit Edison Public School Academy student leaders (30) in grades 6-8, as well as Dove Academy 6th graders (30) who have adopted Oakland University as part of their college readiness program affiliated with No Excuses University, Inc.

participated in leadership training programs conducted by Pre-College Program staff. (October 2008 and March 2009)

Graduating seniors from OU PSAs were eligible to apply for a \$3000 renewable scholarship to the University. One scholarship was awarded for 2008-09.

Other Activities

The PSA Office increased its staff with the addition of Business Manager/Compliance Officer, Marvella Ramsey.

The reauthorization process for the Detroit Academy of Arts and Sciences is ongoing and expected to be finalized soon. The school's current agreement expires June 30, 2009.

The PSA Office is currently working with the board and staff of its newest academy, Four Corners Montessori Academy, to ensure a successful start. The school is slated to open in September 2009, and is on schedule to do so.

PSA REVIEW

The individual PSA updates included as part of this report reflect the following:

- Majority of students are performing at or above proficiency levels in English Language Arts and math as the students in the district in which the school is located.
- Detroit Academy of Arts and Sciences and Weston Preparatory Academy have been identified as High Priority schools and are receiving additional support from MDE and the local intermediate school district, Wayne RESA.
- Average class size in most PSAs is under 30 students.
- None of the PSAs are operating with deficit budgets.
- Enrollment in the University's PSAs in Spring, 2009 was 5661 compared to 5570 for Spring, 2008.

SUMMARY

Authorizing excellent schools is the continued focus of the PSA Office. Our strategic priority is to insure that each PSA educates its students well, utilizes sound governing policies, and fulfills its fiscal and legal responsibilities.

The University's diverse portfolio of PSAs in an urban setting provides PreK-12 learning opportunities that are having a positive impact within their communities. The PSA Office remains a force for quality and strives to hold schools accountable in meeting the high standards and expectations of both the public and families they serve.

The PSA Office provides support to all of its schools in their quest for quality by assisting with resources and training. Further, we endeavor to establish partnerships and explore opportunities within the University that utilize the many advantages it has to offer.
